Adoption is a wonderful thing. It enables those who aren't able to have children, to share in a special relationship with a child, enabling both parents and child to flourish. For those who already have children and still adopt, it again enables that child to flourish and be part of a loving, sustaining, family unit. Many wonderful relationships and families are created through the process of adoption.

The Bible also talks about adoption, us being adopted into God's family. Romans 8:14-16 says; 'All who follow the leading of God's Spirit are God's own [children]. Nor are you meant to relapse into the old slavish attitude of fear—you have been adopted into the very family circle of God and you can say with a full heart, "Father, my Father". The Spirit himself endorses our inward conviction that we really are the children of God. Think what that means. If we are his children we share his treasures, and all that Christ claims as his will belong to all of us as well!" [J.B. Phillips Translation, in brackets mine]

At the time this part of scripture was written, this had real significance. The pervading Roman culture was very hedonistic; devoted to the pursuit of pleasure. The most important thing in life was to enjoy yourself. Consequently, marriages were often not monogamous, and fathers did not know if they were the father of their children. Therefore, a Roman father would adopt a son to be his heir. So being adopted became more important than being an actual son!

Therefore, when the Bible tells us we have been adopted into God's family, it actually gives us a very high status, as we too become heirs, and inherit all the riches of heaven.

So, no matter your up bring or family set up, you have been adopted and are loved by God. As 1 John 3:1 says; 'See what great love the Father has lavished on us, that we should be called children of God!' [NIVUK] So, no matter what life throws at us, no matter our personal circumstances, we are children of God, and are dearly loved.

As number 72 in our Singing the Faith hymnbook says;

Father God, I wonder
how I managed to exist
without the knowledge
of your parenthood
and you loving care.
But now I am your child,
I am adopted in your family,
and I can never be alone
'cause, Father, God,
you're there beside me.




A TRIP TO TOWN?

Thank you Anthea!

Last month Anthea Meek thanked Sylvia Smith for her service over many years as a Pastoral Visitor. In my capacity as one of Anthea's colleagues on the Leadership Team, Flower Fairy rota, coffee/tombola rota and church-decorating-for-special-events rota it is now my turn! I would like to record the thanks of the Leadership Team and the members and affiliates of the church in general, who have enjoyed Anthea's musical contributions to our life at Belfairs. Not only is Anthea now our longest serving church member, she has been playing for us for much of her adult life.

In order to write this article I have returned to the Hundred Years of History that Tina Gowers compiled for us to coincide the Belfairs Methodist Church's centenary in 2011. Anthea's account of her life at Belfairs "through the ages" is a history lesson in itself. Anthea's affiliation to Belfairs started at the age of three when she joined the junior Sunday School: she mentions two services on Sunday's - plus an afternoon Sunday School – with anniversaries when everyone dressed in white. There's scary Sunday School teachers and not daring to ask what tabernacles were, thinking perhaps it might be a rude word! There's best clothes, white gloves, youth club and becoming a Sunday School Teacher at the age of 17.

Around that age, Anthea started playing the organ occasionally – this was just after her dad had physically installed a new organ – located in those days where our own choir currently sings from. There was a choir at every service, sung Amens and once some very squeaky, moaning organ pipes with "hankies" providing a solution.....

Anthea left home to go to college, training as a music teacher, at the age of 18. She returned to Belfairs with her own family some 20 years later. In the meantime she had taught in East London and sang for the BBC Singers choir. Her professional career culminated as Head Teacher at Thorpe Dene Primary School.

Anthea has played for the Parade services for many, many years, along with special services and acting as a reserve musician when necessary. She reluctantly decided to bow out of playing for church services earlier this year.

Methodism has always had caring for others at its heart and Anthea continues to lead, and care for, our Belfairs team of Pastoral Visitors. So thank you Anthea for all your dedication from all of your friends — and family — Belfairs. We miss you being one of our musicians, but it's good to have you down in the congregation with us instead!

CHRISTIAN AID WEEK 12-18 May

Help Christian Aid push back Poverty with your generous donations. Poverty is an outrage against humanity. It robs people of their dignity and lets injustice thrive.

Aline Nibogora, a determined mother in BURUNDI was pushed to the brink of survival by poverty. She suffered abuse at the hands of her violent husband and was forced to flee. He then turned the community against her. Alina lost almost everything. She separated from her children and had to sleep on the streets. 'People forget that I was human,' she told Christian Aid worker. 'I don't want my children to have a painful life like mine.' Aline's situation is not unique. BURUNDI is one of the poorest countries in the world. The global cost of living crisis has intensified the challenges families face and now malnutrition and poverty affect more than 70% of the population putting them on the edge of survival. In the areas where our Christian Aid workers work, people without their own small business or income often head out on an empty stomach each morning to look for casual work to buy food for the evening. Most only eat once a day. Coming back from the edge isn't easy when food is scarce, disease prevalent and jobs hard to come by.

But there is HOPE!!

We can help through Christian Aid to help fund the training that enables communities like Aline's to form a Village Saving and Loans Association, that will support people to grow food, buy medicine and improve their living conditions. Together, we can help ensure that more people in BURUNDI get the skills and knowledge they need to fulfill their ambitions and hopes. We can help families plan for a better future that they'll build together.
